PPG Statement for 2016-17 – High School

The Pupil Premium Grant gives schools extra funding to raise attainment of disadvantaged students from reception to year 11.

The government, in introducing this grant, has left it up to individual schools to allocate the resources to the areas where they will have most impact.

At St Richard Reynolds, we recognise that not all students who are eligible for Free School Meals (FSM) are disadvantaged, and that some disadvantaged students are ineligible for FSM. These students are identified in various ways, in particular the College's pastoral monitoring system, or the monitoring of pupil progress.
