Catholic Social Teaching

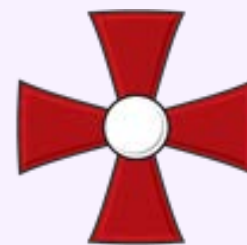

Stations of the cross

The Stations of the Cross is a meaningful way to reflect on the final moments of Jesus' life. From the earliest days of the Church, many believers have desired to walk the same path Jesus walked during His Passion.

For many centuries, travelling to the Holy Land was difficult, expensive, or even dangerous. Therefore, Christians began creating visual representations of the key moments of Jesus' journey. Paintings, carvings, and sculptures were placed in churches and homes so that people could prayerfully follow this "Way of the Cross" without leaving their own community.

After Christianity was officially recognised in 313 AD, when Emperor Constantine legalised the faith, pilgrimages to the Holy Land became more common. However, the majority of believers were still unable to make the journey. In the fifth century, the idea emerged to replicate the holy sites of Jesus' Passion elsewhere, enabling more people to make a spiritual pilgrimage.



Today, the Stations of the Cross usually consist of 14 stations, each representing an important moment in Jesus' suffering and death, from His condemnation by Pontius Pilate to His burial in the tomb. The Stations of the Cross are especially prayed during the season of Lent, when Christians prepare for Easter. Through prayer, Scripture, and reflection at each station, we remember the love and sacrifice of Jesus and are invited to walk spiritually with Him on His journey to the cross.



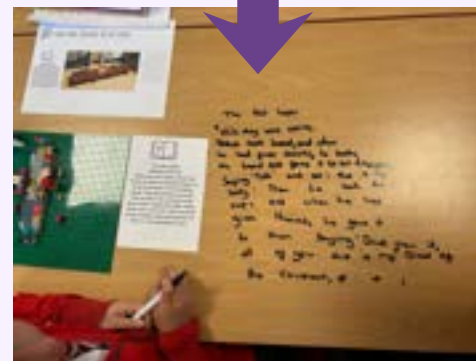
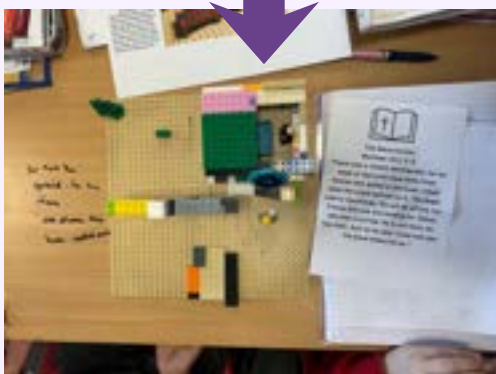
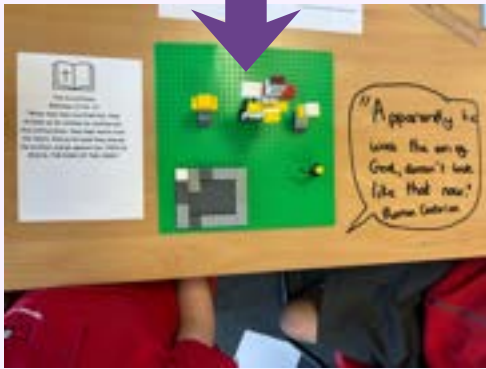
Year 6 took time to walk the Stations of the Cross as part of their RE lessons. They were very prayerful and respectful.

Year 2

Year 2 explored the connection between Jesus' ministry of kindness and His **forgiveness** at the Crucifixion. Through a prayerful **Stations of the Cross** walk around the college, the children gained a sense of the path Jesus walked, helping them recognise that **God always forgives us**.

As part of their **Lent reflections**, the children were introduced to the **Sacrament of Reconciliation**. They gained an understanding of how saying **sorry** helps us make a fresh start and restore our relationship with God as we prepare for the joy of the Resurrection.



Year 3



This term, Year Three has embarked on a wonderful Religious Education journey centered on the importance of the Eucharist. To deepen their understanding, the children explored the connections between the Last Supper and the miracle of the Feeding of the Five Thousand.

A particular highlight was our drama workshop, where the children used "freeze frames" to act out key moments of the parable. It was moving to see them pause and offer such meaningful reflections on what they were portraying.

As we moved into Lent, the class looked outward to the global community, researching how different countries celebrate the Last Supper. It was wonderful to see the children take such a keen interest in other cultures and explore how faith is celebrated with such diversity and beauty across the world.

Year 4



In our "Galilee to Jerusalem" unit, the children have been exploring Jesus' ministry as a healer, linking His miracles to the Anointing of the Sick, Reconciliation, and the truths of the Nicene Creed. As we journey through Lent and move into our "Desert to Garden" unit, we've been reflecting on the significance of Holy Week. The class is making wonderful connections between Jesus' journey to the cross and the Judgement of the Nations, discovering how we can live out the Corporal Works of Mercy in our own lives today.

Year 5

This term in RE, Year 5 have been exploring the period of Lent and how we celebrate/attend mass during lent. We have conducted a deep dive into reconciliation - exploring the steps you take before reconciliation as well as what to do during the event its self, with some of us even taking part in a reconciliation ourselves

As well as this, we have explored important moments in our calander such as Ash Wednesday, and different Lenten Scriptures. We have done some brilliant activities alongside this, such as writing our own poem and creating posters to put up around the school.

Year 6

This term, Year 6 have been studying the Gospel of John as we journey through Lent in preparation for Easter. A particular focus has been on Jesus' "I Am" statements linked to His promise of new life. Through this, pupils have explored how Christians understand Jesus' death and Resurrection, and how these reveal Him as the Messiah and Saviour.

As part of their learning, the children also took part in a thoughtful class debate considering whether Jesus received a fair trial, encouraging them to engage critically with the events leading up to the Crucifixion. This has helped deepen their understanding of the hope of eternal life and the meaning of Easter for Christians today.
